High school ecology classes partner with MSD for a beautiful solution to help keep stormwater out of the sewer system

LOUISVILLE, KY – MSD will expand its successful program of bringing the science of rain gardens to Louisville area schools as students at Louisville Male High School plant a rain garden based on a plan developed by their ecology classes.

MSD Project Administrator Erin Wagoner will oversee the installation of the garden. Planting will begin at 8 AM with the first class starting the project and will be completed when the second class takes over at 9:30 AM.

Wagoner was contacted by Angela Page, a biology and ecology teacher at Jefferson County Public Schools' Louisville Male High School, to instruct students on the ecological benefits of rain gardens. The rain garden at Male High School results from the combination of two plans developed by the two ecology classes. A team of professionals selected the final design from numerous plans pitched by student study groups.

Rain gardens consist of native plants that have adapted to our climate. They have deep, dense root systems that can capture and infiltrate stormwater runoff. Rain gardens keep stormwater out of our combined sewer systems, relieving sewer overflows. The gardens play a part in achieving clean, safe waterways for a healthy and vibrant community.
