MSD's Community Benefits Program Reaches \$2 Million in Local Impact

Schools, parks and community organizations benefit through MSD construction projects

LOUISVILLE, KY – A school's new playground. Improvements to a neighborhood park. Hundreds of hours of volunteer labor or mentorship. All these and more comprise the more than \$2 million in local impact from Louisville MSD's new Community Benefits Program.

While MSD's core function is managing the community's wastewater, stormwater and flood protection facilities, it recently launched the Community Benefits Program to leverage economic, environmental and social impacts through the utility's large-scale engineering, construction and professional service projects.

MSD's Community Benefits program—launched in 2019—focuses on the utility's construction projects over \$2 million or professional service contracts over \$200,000. During the contractor proposal stage, MSD encourages contractors to voluntarily submit community-benefit commitments they will pursue if awarded the project. These can include charitable contributions, volunteer hours, or in-kind services to area nonprofits or schools.

"MSD strives to be a good neighbor every day and we seek to forge partnerships with firms that also have strong commitments to the local community and that apply their resources to provide a positive impact to the communities we serve together," said Sharise Horne, MSD's director of community benefits and partnerships. "We want one-plus-one to equal three for our community."

Outcomes of MSD's Community Benefits program thus far include but are not limited to:

- Planning and construction of a new playground at Whitney Young Elementary
- Improvements to Chickasaw Park through Wilderness Louisville
- Weekend meals throughout the school year for more than 290 students at Engelhard Elementary through Blessings in a Backpack
- Volunteer hours to build and rehab homes for Habitat for Humanity
- 125 trees through the Urban Forestry Program of Louisville Grows
- Supporting minority entrepreneurs through OneWest's "Plan Room," an accelerator for design, construction and supply firms
- Workforce development initiatives through KentuckianaBuilds at the Louisville Urban League
- Scholarship support to STEM-focused students through ACE Mentor Program
- Apple pens and stylus holders for students at the all-girls school, Grace James Academy for Excellence Pathways to Equity apprenticeship program
